THE CONCEPT OF UPCHURCH ENCLAVES IN AMERICA

The idea of "Upchurch Enclaves" has come to mind for two reasons. The first of these surfaced as the *Missing Links* Section of this issue of the UB was being prepared, and is referenced in that section.

Strictly speaking, the definition of an enclave refers to a tract, or area

of land that is mostly or altogether surrounded by foreign territory. As used here it refers to an area in the United States where a group of our early Upchurch ancestors lived. It is true that such areas in the Colonial era were often in the mist of dangerous circumstances.

In any case, interested members of the extended Upchurch family will wish to know not only the Clan and Sub-clan to which they belong but also the location of the enclave(s) of their early American Upchurch ancestors. Those of us who have worked to understand the American Up-

church Family Tree think first about enclaves when trying to place a newly found family member on the Tree.

As examples here is a list of a few American Upchurch Enclaves that come to mind.


Perhaps an additional two dozen entries could be added to the above list, but this sample list serves our purpose for the present. One can

readily grasp that in any given Upchurch enclave there might be recorded several generations of the family but that over time some individuals would move on to new locations. The enclaves vary greatly as to whether present-day Upchurch descendants still live in the enclave. Still, one always finds evidence of some generations in cemeteries, census records, newspaper articles, etc.

Now to the second reason for advancing the enclave concept. It arises out of the issue of whether or not a given Upchurch enclave

Ancestry Says, "Your Privacy is Our Top Priority"

From an article by Ancestry's Chief Privacy Officer, Eric Heath, published in the Ancestry Blog:

"Your privacy is important to us. That's why we want to share our position on a recent event where a Florida judge issued a search warrant to allow law enforcement to search all of GEDmatch, an open data personal genomics database. Following the issuance of the search warrant, GEDmatch opened its database of nearly one million users - beyond those who had consented to such access — within 24 hours. Ancestry believes that GEDmatch could have done more to protect the privacy of its users, by pushing back on the warrant or even challenging it in court. Their failure to do so is highly irresponsible, and deeply concerning to all of us here at Ancestry. GEDmatch's actions stand in stark contrast to

our values and commitment to our customers.

"We want to be clear – protecting our customers' privacy and being good stewards of their data is our highest priority. Not only will we not share customer information with law enforcement unless compelled to by valid legal process, such as a court order or search warrant, we will also always advocate for our customers' privacy and seek to narrow the scope of any compelled disclosure, or even eliminate it entirely. might be subject to the presence of Upchurches from parts of the family only distantly related to the Upchurches who got the enclave started in the first place. This thought surfaced because of recent and ongoing inputs from cooperator Ann (Poe) Grebing of Apex, NC. She is not an Upchurch family member but has a keen interest in family history and is a superb cooperator. Now, it just happens that she once lived in southeast Missouri. She periodically sends articles from the newspaper MISSOURIAN which concentrates on happenings in

or related to southeast Missouri. Recent such inputs have caused us to recognize that members of the Richard U. III/Silas U. Sub-clan occupied an enclave in northwest TN. The counties involved are Lake, Obion, Dyer and Weakley. These counties are just across the Mississippi River from the southeastern tip of Missouri. Perhaps it then should be no surprise that members of the Richard U. /Silas U. Sub-clan who settled in northwest TN in the 1800s would have descendants who would cross the river into MO. Present-day evidence from Ann shows that they did. They not only crossed the river but moved north and impinged upon the

Upchurch enclave representing the Harmon U./James U. VI Sub-clan located in Bollinger and nearby counties in southeast MO. The specific example that illustrates this point comes from Entry 15 in Ann's letter of 23 MAY 2005. This entry reports the death of nee: Alma U. of Scott Co., MO in 2002. She is XID 54636, the GGDAU of Silas U., Head of the Richard U. III/Silas U. Subclan. She was born in the Richard U. Silas U. Sub-clan enclave in Obion Co., TN in 1910 and married in 1928 in Lake Co., TN, in the just mentioned enclave. It is incidental to this article that inputs from Ann continue to facilitate augmentation of our

overall Upchurch records. Significant at this point is that we have advanced the concept of Upchurch Enclaves and have shown that members of one enclave may penetrate the boundaries of another Upchurch Enclave.

This concept of Upchurch Enclaves, their boundaries and the penetration of them by members of other Upchurch Enclaves is useful as we work to make sense of a flood of Upchurch records that continue to surface. While this matter is not earthshaking, it is the sort of idea that gets family historians excited. If we are humored just a little, we will go back to our record processing and stop disturbing the peace and tranquility of our daily contacts.

Upchurch used to hand them out every Christmas Eve. One year, so many people came to see him that he ended up handing out about 150 bags.

"You couldn't find a parking spot," he said. But unfortunately, many of the people only came to the soup kitchen for the \$5. Upchurch noticed they were taking the money and just tossing the food in the garbage.

That's why he decided to start coming unannounced during the week before Christmas.

He said he wants to make sure the goodie bags go to the people who really need them, the people who come to the soup kitchen looking for their next meal. "We just try to give it to the people that normally eat there," Upchurch said. "They're all mighty grateful ... which makes me feel good."

Ophelia Brown, the site manager at the soup kitchen, said she has known Upchurch for a long time. She has been working at the kitchen for almost 14 years.

Brown described him as a nice, thoughtful sort of guy. "He does it on his own, and he enjoys doing it," she said. "He never turned anybody down."

The regulars who eat at the kitchen look forward to the bags every year and start asking about them weeks in advance, Brown said. "I know if I tell one person the word will get out," she said.

But for Upchurch, it's not about how many people come or how much money he gives. It's about lending a helping hand to those who need it.
